

Getting Accommodations in College

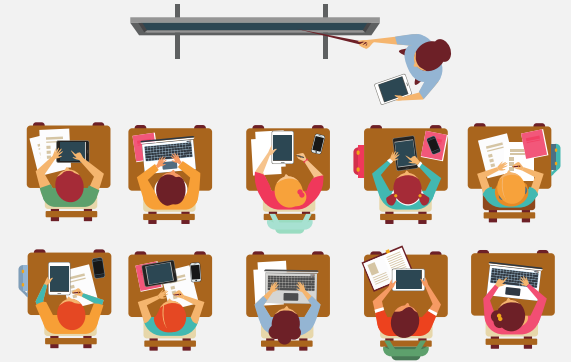
I am going to college.

I should tell them about my needs, and they will help me with accommodations.



I should talk to my professors early in the semester if I need accommodations for class, like a quiet place or extra time on tests.



Disability services can also help me advocate if professors are not being helpful.



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
